"The Power of our Miraculous God"

- Webster defines miraculous as the nature of a miracle; supernatural
- The gift of miraculous power is not about what we do rather it is when we pray for God to intervene He comes and changes the course of natural things
- The gift of miraculous power impacts our physical world
 - As we look at some examples of this it speaks to me...
 - God cares about each of us at a very personal level
 - Pantheism believes that there is no personal relationship with God
 - God demonstrated time and time again His care for us, His creation.
 - Like the gift of healing God will often use us as an instrument of His power

1. Moses

- a. The accounts of Exodus, Leviticus and Numbers records nearly 30 times that God worked in and through Moses to perform some miraculous deed
- b. The first half of these were the call on his life to serve God, the demonstration of God's power (plagues) bringing about the release of the nation of Israel
- c. In most every other case it was to deal with the Israelites complaining and grumbling
 - i. Even at our worst God still loves us and supplies our needs
 - 1. His grace and mercy exceed the judgment we deserve (Rom. 6:23)
 - ii. The final miraculous event was the bronze serpent in the desert (Num. 21:9) release from a punishment and a forerunner of Jesus being raised up and saving us
 - iii. "Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up, that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him." John 3:14-15

2. Elijah

- a. While the miraculous power that God showed through Moses was more about the needs of the people, Elijah was about the power and sovereignty of God
- b. An old-testament prophet who prophesied in the northern kingdom of Israel in the 9th century BC
- c. Northern kingdom suffered through very evil and God-forsaking kings one of who, in Elijah's time, was Ahab who worshipped the pagan god Ba'al
- d. Ahab had a queen by the name of Jezebel who was determined to wipe out all the prophets of God
- e. Still God showed His mercy to those in need with miraculous power events that God brought through Elijah
 - i. God sends him away from Ahab and feeds him by ravens bringing food (I Kings 17:4)
 - ii. Flour and oil do not run out in the widow woman's home (I Kings 17:14)
 - iii. Raises the woman's son from the dead (I Kings 17:22)
- f. Confrontation at Mt. Carmel I Kings 18
 - i. Elijah confronts Ahab and asks for a one on one battle to "prove" who is really God.
 - ii. Two altars are built; 2 bulls slaughtered, quartered and arranged on the altar
 - iii. Elijah instructs the priests of Ba'al to call fire down to their sacrifice
 - iv. After the altar is saturated with water Elijah prays and God consumes it with fire
- 3. <u>Jesus</u> a "lesser" miracle but one filled with importance
 - a. The priests approach Peter and ask if Jesus pays the temple tax (Turn to Matt. 17:24-27)
 - b. The temple tax was implemented by Moses to the people to offset the cost of the construction and the setting up and tearing down the tabernacle (Ex. 30:11-15)
 - c. But by the time of Jesus, the tax was voluntary not mandatory much in the same way our tithes and gifts are given to God today
 - i. What you give to God is not out of law but out of love
 - ii. What you give at RLC is between you and God
 - iii. Example of the widow woman's offering (Luke 21:1-3)

- d. Recognized at the time as a Rabbi Jesus would have been exempt from paying the tax even from the beginning
- e. Knowing Jesus was not from Capernaum the Priests more than likely were attempting yet again to trap Him in some wrong-doing
- f. Of note:
 - i. Jesus knew the conversation that Peter had with the priests ("Jesus was the first to speak..." v 25) even though He was not present
 - ii. He again affirms that He is the Son of The King (v 25)
 - iii. His heart was never to divide (not offend v 27)
 - iv. He provided not only for His own need but took care of Peter as well no matter the circumstances His heart was always to serve
- 4. In each of these the intervention of God's power was and is...
 - a. To demonstrate His power and authority over the natural
 - b. To show His love for His people (the nation of Israel) or a person (Peter)
 - c. To bring relief or resolution to a difficult situation answer to a specific prayer
 - d. George Foreman story
- 5. As in all the gifts the same fundamental elements still apply
 - a. No matter how great or how small it is done according to His will and in His time
 - b. The person praying and asking for this miraculous intervention is not responsible for it happening
 - c. Pride will disqualify that person from being used of God (either immediately or at some time)
 - d. Every aspect of the miracle and how it is done will point people to God never to a person
